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juror's statement

Printmaking was once only thought of as a medium used to reproduce, in signed limited editions, popular images already created by artists. The purpose of this was democratic, to allow anyone the opportunity to own popular works. In the past few decades, however, we have seen printmaking transform into a medium, which has the ability to demand the same attention as painting, sculpture, photography and film.

or artist books, however. They are each distinctive works of art that express individual thoughts, which can only be realized through the choice of printmaking as the medium. As a printmaker, it has been an invigorating experience to jury an exhibition that presents the passion, risk-taking, patience and reward of all printmaking processes.

Contemporary artists and printmakers have transformed the age-old medium by incorporating new technology with the traditional forms of printmaking such as etching, relief, lithography, and papermaking. With technological and chemical advancements in the processes used to create prints, artists have been able to create more complicated and sophisticated works, which employ multiple printmaking mediums to build up an image. In most cases, artists are able to create images that they never could have actualized without incorporating both new and traditional printmaking processes. As the works become more complex and advanced, the images become unique.

The national juried exhibition, *Ink*, *Press*, *Repeat*, showcases contemporary printmaking, bringing its processes to the center stage. The works exhibited are examples of how the medium has evolved, becoming a mark-making tool with which to create original imagery. These works are not just prints, monoprints, monotypes,



KATIE MURKEN

My artistic process could be likened to the movement of a pendulum—from a fixed perspective I gather inspiration from disparate temporal, geographic and philosophical sources. I am committed to studio process as the means by which this material and immaterial content can be developed to produce unexpected associations within the work and with the viewer.

My vocabulary includes installation, artist books and works on paper. These approaches provide a set of related spatial frameworks through which I explore the sites of overlap between the dualities in my work—nature and architecture, serendipity and pattern, communication and distance, inhabitance and vacancy.

In all of my works, I strive for a material sensibility that evokes something of itself and something beyond itself, leading me towards gentle yet insistent manipulations of surface and form. I restrict my materials to those that appeal to an elemental sensibility and my actions to those that are direct and referential. This allows me to construct actual and illusionistic environments whose transformative power is rooted in the fundamental human need to understand and to shape one's surroundings.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Trained as a printmaker and book artist, Katie Murken coordinates site-specific installations that position her hand-made objects, books and drawings in relationship to diverse environments. Murken has shown her work regionally and nationally, including exhibitions at the Contemporary Arts Center, Las Vegas, NV; Antenna Gallery, New Orleans, LA; The Print Center in Philadelphia, PA; The Pittsburgh Center for the Arts, PA; and the 23 Sandy Gallery in Portland, OR. In 2011, Murken received the Alumni Travel Grant from the Center for Emerging Visual artists for a residency at the Babayan Culture House in Cappadocia, Turkey. She currently teaches a Book Arts course at Tyler School of Art, Temple University in Philadelphia, PA.
