# Grant Awards and Contracts Received By WPUNJ

Successfully competing for a grant is an important validation of the work that lead up to the proposal, of the project that it defined, and of the people involved. The competition for all types of projects -- whether research, reform, service, curriculum development or equipment -- is very strong and will probably grow stronger, meaning that the quality of the proposal and the project must be virtually perfect to be selected.

Each year, about fifty proposals are delivered to funding agencies, foundation and corporations from the Office of Sponsored Programs, and about twenty of those receive funding. This issue of The STAR Report has been developed to announce awards we have received during the last year and to highlight and celebrate selected awards we have received during the last two years. These highlighted project include: the full range of types of projects and both grant awards and contracts.

# Dr. Michel Chirichello U.S. Department of Education New Jersey Statewide Teacher Quality Enhancement Consortium \$2,490,000 Million over Five Years

The College of Education is working to change the way future teachers are prepared and new and veteran teachers are supported. Under the leadership of Dr. Chirichello, a former superintendent of Schools and Principal, the College is working in partnership with the College of Science and Health, the College of Humanities and Social Sciences and the College of Arts and Communication, the Paterson, Passaic, Garfield, Totowa and Lincoln Park school districts. The project is part of a statewide project based at Kean University and involving Rowan Universities and nine other local school districts.

# Mr. Allen Williams U.S. Department of Justice COPS MORE 2000 \$89,696

This grant follows a mul.ti-year award from the Justice Department to introduce "community policing officers" to the University community. This grant will enable Campus Police to hire civilians to assume non-policing duties which have been carried out by sworn police officers in

recent years. Activities such as supporting dispatch, staffing satelite offices, and processing reports will now be done by support staff.

Community policing is a new strategy that has been widely utilized to increase the visible presence of police officers in the community. Typically, officers on foot or bicycle patrol are encouraged to develop friendships with the people on their "beat" to more accurately understand the real needs of the neighborhood they serve.



The OSP subscribes to newsletters that provide information on funding opportunties, maintains a library of books and resources that support the grants process, CD-ROM and Internet-based databases for identifying funding opportunities, distributes email announcements of new funding opportunities, and supports a website with a variety of resources covering everything from finding funding opportunities to managing funded projects to complying with federal regulations.

# OSP Reference and Research Services Expanded

The OSP now has a dedicated computer workstation ready for quickly access its CD-ROM and Internet-based databases as well as other resources and services avialable on the Internet. FC-Search, the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, the Grant Resource Center's GrantSearch and Oryx Publication's Grant Select are easy-to-use tools that reduce searches to minutes. Each provides additional resources, from direct links to the agencies and programs included in its database to "how-to" manuals on how to write different kinds of proposals.
