Nancy Einreinhofer University Galleries New Jersey State Council on the Arts \$54,000

The University Art Galleries, under the direction of Dr. Nancy Einreinhofer, received a \$54,000 multiyear grant from the New Jersey State Council on the Arts in 2000. Providing \$18,000.00 annually, the grant supports exhibitions, lectures and publications in a diverse array of artistic endeavors. Included in the Fall 2001 schedule were paintings of WPU people by Marvin Fried-



man, ceramic sculpture by Bill Stewart, and a collection of photographs of artists in their studios. These exhibits were reviewed by the New York Times. The Friedman exhibit was featured on NJN's "State of the Arts" program including an interview with the artist and Dr. Einreinhofer.

The University galleries consist of five galleries totaling 8200 square feet of exhibition space located in two buildings: Ben Shahn and the Power Art Building. These galleries make excellent examples of contemporary art, accompanied by educational materials, available to both the WPU community and the public in surrounding areas. The role of the galleries is to present changing exhibitions and to maintain and exhibit the University's permanent collections, as well as present lectures on art. The Power Art gallery is dedicated to showing the work of students, including regional high school students, and faculty. In addition to the exhibition spaces, the gallery program maintains and manages the University's sixteen collections, the most visible of which is the "Sculpture on Campus" collection of twenty-one large scale outdoor sculptures by contemporary artists of national reputation.

Gallery Director Nancy Einreinhofer, who holds a Ph.D. in Museum Studies, and her assistant Margaret Culmone, manage this exciting program. With the continuing support of the New Jersey Council on the Arts, the galleries will continue to educate and inspire us.

Nancy Norris-Bauer NJ Historical Commission NJ History Day 2002 \$20.000

Tancy Norris-Bauer, Director of the Office of Field Experience in the College of Education, secured a grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission in support the New Jersey History Day program, scheduled for April 2002. This annual powerful teaching experience is part of the National History Day competition program. Over 800 students participated in the 2001 program, more than could be accomodated at WPU, so for the 2002 program - for which we expect over 1000 students to participate, two regional competitions will be

held prior to statewide event. More than 600,000 elementary and high school students across the country participate in National History Day programs, researching historical events and presenting their finding at History Day events in every state. Winners of all these preliminary program events, travel to Maryland for the national competition. This year, a special workshops will be offered to New Jersey's winners to enhance their ability to compete successfully at the national program.

 Υ ancy is more than the Project Director for New Jersey History Day, she has become a recongnized advocate for improving history education. "This program is special—students really get involved," said Ms. Norris-Bauer. "They use primary resources, such as diaries and interviews do the research. The contest is a vehicle to share their learning. The purpose of the program," she continued, "is to change the way history is taught and learned in elementary and secondary schools by challenging students to conduct meaningful historical inquiry and providing a positive learning environment in which students' work is evaluated outside the classroom." The number of students involved, the organizations on the advisory council, and an award she received from the New Jersey Historical Commission are just a few of the signs that her dedication has stimulated this project, students, schools and organizations across the state.

This grant award is the third from the New Jersey Historical Commission for New Jersey History Day. Ms. Norris-Bauer has previously recieved \$15,000 for the 2000 program and \$10,000 for the 2001 program. William Paterson University is proud to support Ms. Norris-Bauer's efforts as the state coordinator for this terrific program.
