**Important**: Many students believe that an online course is less demanding than a faceto-face course. This is definitely not the case! About your postings: You will be posting twice per day:

- 1. The first post is due <u>by noon</u> on the due date. This posting is a thoughtful reaction to something that you have read. I am looking at the quality of your response and expect a reasonable amount of detail. So, for example you may want to talk about the article "More Experiences=Bigger Brains". First you should <u>summarize</u> the portion of the article you wish to discuss, including a <u>citation</u> to the specific location in the text so that others can easily find the work you are referring to, and then you should provide your <u>thoughtful reaction</u> to it.
- Your second posting can be submitted any time <u>after midday and until midnight</u> of that day. Your second posting is a <u>reaction</u> to what your fellow classmates have written. In your second posting I am again looking for a <u>substantial</u>, <u>thoughtful</u> response. Saying you agree or disagree with someone is insufficient. Anything you post should also be substantiated by the readings (including page numbers and direct quotes if needed).

**Note:** <u>**You can submit all your "first" postings on the first day of class**</u>! I suspect many of you will have finished reading your text before the class begins. You can preprepare your first response and simply upload it into the appropriate discussion board when the course opens. If you follow this advice, you will then be able to really focus on the second, interactive posting while the course is actively running. It is also a way to spread out the work load so that instead of scrambling to meet deadlines you can reflect more on your learning. I strongly recommend this option.</u>

About the exams: Just kidding – there are no exams or tests!

### **Teaching Methods:**

This course is a purely on-line course. In order to do well in this course you will need to be very responsible and self-motivated. If you do not keep up with the readings and postings you will quickly fall far behind. On-line classes require you to be more self-disciplined than traditional lecture classes.
