Featured Student Presenters:



Jillian Mulderig is majoring in Business Administration and completing the Honors Literary and Performing Arts Track. Her thesis project, *Fine Mingling*, focuses on the genre of narrative writing. Jillian has composed a work of fiction set around the topic of the after-life and exemplifying common themes found in literature: the inevitability of death and the effects it has on life; human struggles against God and faith; and the significance of love in humanity and its ability to prevail over all obstacles. Her Honors thesis project was supervised by Dr. Philip Cioffari.



William Test is majoring in Jazz and Classical Piano Performance and completing the Honors Music Track. His thesis project, *An Analytic Look at the Development of Modern Jazz Piano*, analyzes the development of jazz from the 1940's bebop era to near modern day. Predominantly a musicological study, this work focuses on providing an overview intended to help educate the jazz community on the importance of understanding the evolution of harmony and melody for success in the modern jazz world. His work in the Music Honors Track was supervised by Dr. Jeffrey Kresky, and his thesis project was supervised by Dr. David Demsey.



John Strevens is majoring in English (writing concentration), and completing the Honors Literary and Performing Arts Track. His thesis project, *Modern Man's Hustle*, focuses on contemporary life and the direct effect on modern times. Inspired by Hemingway, John focused on how his characters struggled with their times, and attempted to understand not only the world around them, but their place in history. His Honors thesis project was supervised by Dr. Philip Cioffari.



About the Honors College at William Paterson University...

The University Honors College is a place where academically gifted students explore new ideas and engage in intellectual and creative collaborations with experienced and dedicated members of the faculty. Honors students are offered a comprehensive educational experience that brings together academic, residential, social and cultural experiences. Approximately 350 students are actively participating in the Honors College in Honors sections of General Education courses and/or one of the eleven Honors Tracks. Each fall, about 100 new students enter the Honors College, and about half of those live in the Honors Learning Community in High Mountain East, one of the newest residence halls on campus.

Students in the Honors College pursue a disciplinary major and an Honors track. The track may parallel the major, relate to the major, or be very different from the major. Although the various tracks have different requirements, each track culminates in a thesis or significant research or creative project that the student presents to the University community. The two oldest tracks, Biopsychology and Humanities, were established in 1976. The Honors Program was established in 2000, and was expanded into the University Honors College in 2005. There are currently eleven Honors tracks: Biopsychology, Cognitive Science, Humanities, Independent, Life Science and Environmental Ethics, Management, Marketing, Music, Nursing, Performing and Literary Arts, and Social Sciences.
