Overview of 3+1

- Must graduate from Mercer or any NJ community college with an AA, AS, AFA, or AAS degree.
- Apply to William Paterson the semester before you graduate and select the WP/MCCC 3+1 Partnership Agreement Program on the WP application.
- Receive an application fee waiver at the time of application and follow all standard procedures for application, including requesting and submitting all official transcripts
- Transfer in all 60 credits and have your WP general education requirements (UCC) waived for AA, AS, and AFA graduates. AAS graduates can complete their outstanding WP general education requirements in year 3 at MCCC.
- Stay at MCCC in the third or junior year, register for third-year MCCC courses, and pay MCCC's tuition. (During the third year at MCCC, while earning 60 90 credits, students must complete the WP/MCCC 3+1 Advising Form for every term. This form enables WP advisors to approve MCCC courses through the New Jersey Transfer Equivalency Tool sponsored by www.njtransfer.org ensuring degree program

- A Financial Aid Consortium Agreement allows MCCC to process financial aid for students for their 60-90 credits being completed at MCCC.

Liberal Studies- An Interdisciplinary Major in the Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences

The Liberal Studies AHHSS major combines interdisciplinary training in the arts, humanities, and social sciences, allowing students to participate in a flexible yet rigorous program. The Liberal Studies Major consists of 45 credits. Of these, 9 credits are specifically liberal studies courses. The remaining 36 credits are filled by two tracks of 18 credits each. Upon completion, students will understand: the interconnection among the arts, humanities and social sciences; have considerable exposure to two academic areas; and develop research, written, and oral communication skills. The major is offered by the College of the Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences. It is housed in the Department of Philosophy.

The MAJOR consists of 39 to 45 credits, as follows:

- 1. Core Requirements 9 credits
 - A. LBST 2010 Liberal Studies Colloquium: Selected Topics 3 credits (Must be taken at the beginning of the major)
 - B. LBST 2500, LBST 4980, or Experiential Learning Requirement: Students must take either the Liberal Studies and Community Engagement Course, complete and internship of at least 3 credits in either of their tracks or through the Liberal Studies Program (LBST 4980), or complete another experiential learning course such as practicum for double majors in the Education program.
 - C. LBST 4800 Senior Capstone Seminar: Selected Topics 3 credits

Students may also fulfill this requirement by taking a Senior Seminar in one of the two chosen tracks.

2. Track Requirement

Students must select any two tracks consisting of 18 credits, for a minimum of 36. Course selection will be done in consultation with the Liberal Studies Advisor or the Director.

B.A. IN PSYCHOLOGY

The psychology major is one of the most popular majors at William Paterson University. The William Paterson University Bachelor's Degree in Psychology Completion Program at the Mercer County Community College campus offers students...

- Small class sizes taught by university professors who are scholars in their field
- In-person, hybrid, and online options for courses
- Individualized academic advisement by fulltime faculty
- Opportunities to complete internships in psychology for college credit in the Mercer area

The BA in Psychology degree prepares graduates for careers in psychology as well as continued graduate study in the field of psychology. An undergraduate major in psychology provides a solid background for advanced study in clinical psychology, counseling, social work, education, law, public administration, health care, human resources, marketing, and market research. The WPU Psychology Department also offers a master's degree program in Clinical and Counseling Psychology, and a doctoral degree program in Clinical Psychology.

Requirements of the Psychology Major

Pre-requisites (10 credits):

PSY 1100 – General Psychology – (PSY 101 at Mercer CCCC) - 3 credits

MAT 1100 or MAT 1300 or College Math, Contemporary Math, or Statistics – (MAT 125 with MAT 120 or MAT 126 at Mercer CCCC) - 3 credits

BIO 1140 or BIO 1200 - Applied Anatomy and Physiology or Human Biology – (BIO 106 at Mercer CCCC) - 4 credits

William Paterson University students must also complete the foreign language requirement by either taking two courses in the same non-English language, or by placing out of the requirement by taking a foreign language proficiency exam.

Academic Minors in Degree Programs

The following minors are available in the WP at Mercer degree programs:

- English
- History
- Political Science
- Psychology
- Sociology (totally online, but one traditional course is offered during the semester at Mercer)

Minors are available to all students at WP at Mercer with a caveat for Liberal Studies majors (see point C below). All minors offered at WP at Mercer are 18 credits. Other important information about minors:

- A. Students can only transfer in up to half of the credits in the minor
- B. At least half of the credits for the minor must be taken at WPU
- C. Students cannot select a minor in the same discipline as one of their tracks for the Liberal Studies major (for example, a Liberal Studies English track student cannot minor in English)
- D. WP at Mercer students may request a minor by going onto their WP Connect accountunder the student tab, look for Academic Services, then select Add/Declare or Change Minor.

One Writing course: ENG 3300, ENG 2310, ENG 3000, ENG 3090, ENG 3240, ENG 3320 (pre-req ENG 2310), ENG 3330 (pre-req ENG 3300), ENG 3340 (pre-req ENG 2310 or ENG 3300), ENG 3380 (pre-req ENG 2310), ENG 3390 (pre-req ENG 2310), ENG 3430 (pre-req ENG 2310), or ENG 3550 (pre-req ENG 2310).

Three elective courses in writing or literature, however, one must be a literature course before 1900 (you can tell if an ENG course covers a period before 1900 by reading the course description at the English Dept. website or in the course catalog).
