

## **About Sociology**

An undergraduate sociology degree provides valuable insight into social factors such as race, ethnicity, gender, age,

education, and social class that affect how institutions operate. Students who graduate with a degree in sociology and enter the job market directly not only hold a valuable liberal arts degree, but have an advantage—knowledge of social inequalities and a firm grasp of research design and methods.

#### **SOCIAL SERVICES CONCENTRATION:** This concentration

is designed for students seeking a career in social work and social services. Students take several courses specifically about the field of social work, in addition to the standard sociology curriculum. In their senior year, students complete an internship in an area of the field within which they seek employment. Most find the experience to be a strong first step toward beginning a career in a profession such as social work. Many choose to go on to graduate training in social work, psychology, or a related field.

#### GENERAL SOCIOLOGY OR APPLIED SOCIOLOGY CONCENTRATIONS:

Students with a strong interest in community activism may prefer to concentrate in applied sociology, where a community internship is required. All other students should choose the general sociology concentration, where the internship is optional.

### Sociology Field Work Opportunities:

The 3-credit field work course gives practical work experience in a variety of settings. Students typically work a minimum of 8 hours a week under the supervision and guidance of an on-site supervisor in community, corporate, or social services work environments.

Students typically find placements in hospitals (medical sociology, social service); consumer relations, market research, personnel, public affairs (research methods, organizations); museums and galleries; senior citizen centers (family, aging); and welfare agencies (social services).


