## AMERICAN GOVERNMENT WINTER ONLINE (POL 1200-80)

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# **Course Objectives:**

This online course is intended to introduce you to both the formal and informal processes and institutions of American political life. In particular, the course will focus the institutional and ideological landscape of U.S. politics from the founding through present on selected topics. Institutional topics will include the "Founding", constitutional design, separation of powers, federalism, civil liberties and civil rights, and the meaning of the shift from congressionally centered government to presidential government in modern era. Themes will include the relationship between an active electorate, strong and competitive parties and limits on special interests and the quality of democratic governance.
