Course Overview:

This course is organized into two parts as follows: The first part focuses on basic concepts and methods of geography, and the application of these concepts and methods to the study and understanding of our world. The second part explores the geography of major regions of the world. Overall, this course is designed to provide students with and understanding of the economic, demographic, environmental, political, social, and cultural factors which have shaped the distinctive physical and human geographies of the different regions of the world.

Course Objectives:

At the end of the course you should:

- 1. Know the basic concepts and methods of geography
- 2. Know the demographic, economic, and environmental characteristics of world regions
- 3. Be able to differentiate between world regions in terms of key geographic characteristics
- 4. Be able to describe and discuss differences in development between world regions
- 5. Discuss the nature of the relationships between the major world regions
- 6. Understand some of the global processes and trends shaping the world today
