As you may recall, Teaching Fellows will receive stipends of \$30,000 and tuition remission of \$10,000 each to complete the MAT and a yearlong teacher residency. Ten Woodrow Wilson Fellows will be recruited in the areas of science and mathematics education to begin the new program in summer 2014. International Collaborations

Dutch Educators Visit Woodrow Wilson Middle School in Clifton

For the past several years, William Paterson University and Windesheim University in the Netherlands have participated in a partnership that promotes international study options and an exchange of faculty members and students. On Tuesday, March 12, 2013, Dr. Georgiana Walsh, Professor In Residence (PIR) at Woodrow Wilson Middle School in Clifton, hosted a group of seven graduate students and a professor from Windesheim University. The Dutch educators were interested in learning more about the special education programs being offered at the middle school. Throughout the morning, the group visited inclusion and selfcontained special education classrooms. Following classroom observations, the Dutch visitors met with special education teachers and administrators from Woodrow Wilson Middle School during lunch to dialogue, ask additional questions, and exchange ideas about special education.



Teaching the World

On April 25, Hilary Wilder, associate professor in the University's Educational Leadership and Professional Studies Department, gave a presentation at the Second Annual Teaching the World Forum hosted by the Rutgers Graduate School of Education. Wilder, a 2012-2013 Teaching

the World Fellow, reported on two projects designed to internationalize teacher education. These projects included a collaborative project between William Paterson students enrolled in CIEE 2130 - Teaching in a Technological World and University of Namibia peers enrolled in a similar course. Students were pairedup and asked to first create a personal Glog® as a way of introducing themselves to their partners. The goal of the collaborative project was to create a "Cyber-Smart" Glog® that could be used in NJ and Namibian classrooms to inform students of their digital citizenship rights and responsibilities. The second project paired William Paterson students enrolled in CIEE 3220 - Language Arts and Social Studies Methods/Assessment for Teaching for K-5 who were doing their practicum experience in Grade 3 classes in Paterson School 12, with University of Guyana peers who were also in field experiences in Grade 3 classes. For this project, both sets of students were asked to develop and carry out (in their respective field experience classrooms) a project-based lesson based on the UNESCO Education for Sustainable Development curriculum and then have their students share their projects via Skype® or similar technology.

Professional Development Schools in Action

Book Study Focuses on Active Learning

Teachers at Passaic School 11 recently participated in a lunch and learn book study with Jean Modig, William Paterson's professor in residence. The fifteen book study group members were issued a copy of *Total Participation Techniques: Making Every Student an Active Learner* by William and Persida Himmele, courtesy of William Paterson University. They met weekly during lunchtime to discuss each new chapter. They learned about the importance of pausing repeatedly to allow for student processing and to check for understanding. As a means to demonstrate their learning, students enjoy using the cause/effect, true/false, fact/opinion paddles that have been provided for them. Total participation techniques (TPTs) are credited with engendering active participation and deeper learning by all students.



Lights, Camera, Action: Innovative Use of Technology in the Classroom



As part of an assembly program organized by Jean Modig, professor in residence, at International High School, students were asked to assume the role of president of the United States and to deliver a press conference about an important present-day issue. Green screen technology was employed in filming their responses, which allowed students to appear in their location of choice. Some addressed their audience from inside the oval office. One student argued against the death penalty while standing in a lethal injection chamber. In addition to assuming the role of the president of the United States, some students

screen technology to small groups of interested teachers and students. They were taken through the steps of filming, editing and producing their own videos. Students and teachers will be able to incorporate this new technology into their presentations with equipment that will soon be available at the school.

Professor Rochelle Goldberg Kaplan Retires

The College of Education is sad to say goodbye to our colleague and friend, Dr. Rochelle Kaplan. Kaplan was the "voice for graduate studies at WP." She served for many years on the Senate's Graduate Councils and chaired both councils. Kaplan is an expert in young children's mathematical thinking and taught and/or developed over a dozen courses in the COE. Kaplan was hired as an assistant professor in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction in 1988 to teach developmental psychology, educational research, and math methods. She was promoted to associate professor in 1995, served as department chair from 1995-1998, and in 2000, was promoted to professor. In 2007 she moved to the Department of Educational Leadership and Professional Studies and served as its chair from 2007-2009. Kaplan was a graduate program director from 1997 - 2011 and developed the Teaching Children Mathematics program with colleagues Peter Appelbaum and Althea Hylton-Lindsay. She served as coordinator of this program from 1997 - 2013. Kaplan directed the College's math clinic from 1998 - 2013. She has published more than 20 refereed articles and book chapters, has presented at numerous local, national and international conferences,

and received several grants including from the National Science Foundation, the Schumann Fund of New Jersey, and New Jersey Department of Higher Education.



Kaplan was an active member and former secretary of the Northeastern Educational Research Association (NERA) and she remains active in educational research including a current investigation into the Characteristics of Effective Elementary Mathematics and Literacy Teachers in NJ and Israel with colleagues Dorothy Feola and Gerri Mongillo. Kaplan will be remembered most fondly by her students for mentoring more than 150 master's theses and coaching them onward to professional excellence in their schools and communities.

Professor Holly Seplocha Recognized for Her Work in ECE

Dr. Holly Seplocha was recognized as an alumna of Wheelock College, Boston, MA, for embodying its mission and philosophy of caring for others, leading communities, and making a difference in the lives of children and

families as part of the college's 125th anniversary celebration. After completing her master's degree at Wheelock College, Seplocha began her career as a preschool teacher, became an early education administrator, earned a doctoral degree at Rutgers University, and is now a full professor at William Paterson University sharing her knowledge and passion for early childhood education with others.

Seplocha is also a recipient of the Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award from the National Association of Early Childhood Teacher Educators. She has conducted extensive research with the New Jersey Department of Education and the National Institute for Early Education Research, and she has made significant contributions to the field through hundreds of publications and presentations across the US. In 2005, she was the opening speaker for the Oxford University Roundtable on Early Literacy in Oxford, England.
