

In your third year, find out when the graduate entrance exams for your field are held. Start preparing to take those exams. Also, ask professors which graduate programs they recommend. Look at the due dates for applications and think about when you need to take exams so that your scores are received in time. Start thinking about which professors can write letters of recommendation on your behalf. You may need to schedule the exam or exams in the summer between your third and fourth year. You may also need to work on a writing sample during the summer.

In your fourth year, ask professors for letters of recommendation in September. Make appointments with your recommenders to get advice about what to write in your application. Your professors can give you more specific information about how to apply to particular graduate programs.

Advice from a former Honors student:

Step back and look at the big picture

Recently, we had the opportunity to catch up with Honors alum, Carla Rainey Clutcher, a 2012 graduate of the Honors Cognitive Science Track.

What was the topic of your Honors thesis?

My Honors thesis was on the topic of determinism, a philosophical alternative to the idea of free will. It explored the neurobiology behind how our brains make choices, as well as the philosophy and cognitive science behind how our consciousness perceives those apparent choices.

How did the Honors College help you in graduate school, and later in your career?

In general, I think being part of the Honors College simply helps students to stand out. Whether that's on a graduate school application or a resume, it shows that you've gone the extra mile in your pursuit of education. More specifically, practicing interdisciplinary thinking has assisted often in my career. I currently work as a Registered Dietitian at a specialty hospital for the treatment of eating disorders. Working as part of a multidisciplinary team of medical providers, therapists, educators, culinary staff, and administrators means that I have to be able to step back from my specific concentration and see a bigger picture for my patients. The Honors College, and the multidisciplinary thesis structure, helped me practice how to do that.

What have you conducted research on in the past, and are you currently working on any research projects?

Since graduating from the Honors College, I have conducted research on nutritional topics including the biological effects of different dietary styles and the relationship between dietary habits and mental health. I am not personally working on any research at the moment, but the hospital I work with continually researches different topics within the field of eating disorders.

What advice would you give to Honors students in the process of writing their thesis and/or to those interested in graduate school?

I would definitely recommend that students start practicing stepping back and looking at the bigger picture, when you can. Sometimes in the chaos of exams, papers, and scheduling, it can be difficult to look at one undergraduate project and imagine it as a defining part of your education. But it can be. I'd suggest using it as an opportunity to look at topics you know well, but in a new way. Find a question that hasn't been answered yet and answer it. It's not often that we have the opportunity, time, and support to delve into things that genuinely interest us. Take a step back and allow this to fuel your interests, and perhaps assist in defining your interests in specific careers or graduate level options.

Please comment on your Honors College experience:

My Honors experience was fantastic. Not only did I meet great friends and wonderful professors, but it also gave me the space to pursue academic interests that didn't exactly fit in my major. I completed pre-med requirements during undergrad, but did not want to take traditional paths of making biology or chemistry my major. I loved philosophy, and chose that as my major, but there was not much overlap between these and my science courses. The Honors College Cognitive Science Track allowed me to mesh these topics together into subjects that interested me. In doing so, it taught me how seemingly different disciplines can often lend a hand to one another in an attempt to answer complex questions.

Jan's tips for student success

Are you ready for priority
registration?

Priority Registration is this Monday, November 5th 9:00 a.m.—9:00 p.m.

Be sure to request permits in advance.

All Honors courses require permits (an electronic code that gives you access to closed classes). To request a permit for an Honors course, email honors@wpunj.edu and include your name, 855#, and the title and CRN number of the course you are requesting. Be aware that some non-Honors classes might also require permits. In order to request a permit for a non-Honors Course, contact the department offering the course. Honors cannot issue permits for non-Honors courses.

Check for "holds." Holds could be placed on your account for several reasons including parking tickets, overdue library books, non-completion of Alcohol Wise and Not Anymore, a balance on your account, etc. Check under your student tab on WP Connect for holds. The Honors staff cannot remove holds, but we can help you figure out where to go for help.

Register as early as possible on November 5th.

Priority Registration opens at 9:00 a.m. and lasts for one day only. Be sure to log-in and register as early in the day as possible. This way, if you run into a problem, you'll still have a chance of getting it resolved that day. Many key offices (including the Honors College) will be super busy on priority registration day and usually close around 4:30 p.m.

Register in 60 seconds. By doing some simple preparation, registration can be completed in 60 seconds or less. Prior to the 5th, write down all your classes (preferably on a scheduling grid), and make sure that none of the times overlap and that you are satisfied with your daily schedule. Make a list of the five digit course registration numbers (CRN's). Once priority registration is available, you can go to the add/drop courses under your student tab on WP Connect, insert your registration alternative pin number, type in your CRN numbers in the boxes provided, and hit submit.

Resources are in place to help you. Questions or concerns? Please see the list on the right for more information about where to go for help. Remember, if you cannot get the issue resolved on your own, you can always contact the Honors Office (please see contact information in the box below).

Permits for non-Honors courses

If you require a permit for a non-Honors course, you must contact the department that is offering the course. (Sorry, the Honors College cannot issue permits for non-Honors courses.)

Six Digit Alternate Pin Numbers

Your advisor should have provided you with the six digit alternate pin number that you will enter in WP Connect. This pin number changes each semester. The first three digits of your pin should begin with 000. If your pin does not begin with 000, please contact Honors for assistance.

Registration times

Registration will be open from 9:00 a.m.—9:00 p.m. on 11/5. If you have difficulty logging into the system at 9:00 a.m., please wait a few minutes and try again. If the issue persists, please contact Honors (honors@wpunj.edu). Be sure to include your name, 855 number and a brief description of the problem you are experiencing. We will get back to you as soon as possible.
