## **American Literature to 1865**

<u>Course Description and Course Objectives</u>: In this course, we will survey American literature written from the colonial period to 1865, including colonial foundations, Puritanism, the Enlightenment, and American Romanticism. We will look at important issues like contact between colonizers and native peoples, the slave trade, and the woman question. From the revolutionary period to the Civil War, we will look at how literature responded to the changes occurring in the United States. The writings of early Americans can teach us how their perceptions helped to shape the attitudes of the new nation and in turn informed what it meant to be an American.

<u>Student Learning Outcomes</u>: By the end of the semester, I expect you will be able to identify the major literary figures from the colonial period to 1865. You will also have a familiarity with the different genres of the period to include diaries, captivity narratives, slave narratives, religious poetry, historical chronicles, short stories, and the novel.
