COURSE TIME & LOCATION:

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides broad coverage of the formation of the so-called "modern world." It traces the political, economic, social, cultural, and intellectual developments and interactions among the principal regions of the world – Europe, the Middle East, Africa, Asia and the Americas – from the early modern period to our contemporary era. In doing so, the course addresses the issue of what made the "modern world" so *modern* (i.e., unique and different) in the first place. Topics include the formation of the modern Western world-system; the voyages of Western-European expansion; the formation of Atlantic slavery; the Enlightenment era; the industrial revolution; colonialism; the anti-colonial movements; the Fifties/Sixties social movements; contemporary globalization; global warming, climate change, and global inequality; to name a few. *This course meets the UCC-3B: Historical Perspectives requirement for the university*

DISCUSSION BOARDS:

DISCUSSION BOARDS RULES:

Discussion Boards can be found in the Discussion Board folders under the Units 1 through 11 folders. You are required to post at least TWO (2) responses per Unit — a 1st Post Assignment and a 2nd Post Commentary. The 1st Post Assignment is your response to my Discussion Board Assignment question. The 2nd Post Commentary is your commentary on and/or analysis of another student(s) 1st Post Assignment. Your 1st Post Assignment MUST always be submitted before your 2nd Post Commentary.

The UNIT 1 Discussion Board is for student Introductions. You will submit a 1st Post Introduction of yourself and reply to someone else with a 2nd Post Greeting. The UNIT 1 Discussion Board will also help you become familiar with working in the Discussions portion of Blackboard.

The UNITS 2 to 11 Discussion Boards are the main aspect of the course. A "Sample 1st Post Assignment" and a "Sample 2nd Post Commentary" for Units 2 through 11 can be found in the "Syllabus, etc." folder under the "Content "section of Blackboard. Open the folders and click on the "Sample 1st Post Assignment" and "Sample 2nd Post Commentary" attachments. Your Discussion Boards submissions for Units 2 through 11 should be modeled on these examples to earn the fullest possible points.

You will be graded primarily on content. However, the quality of your presentation (i.e., grammar, sentence structure, and spelling) also impacts grading. Reason being, you must present your ideas clearly so that your content can be understand. Your writing should therefore be near (but not absolutely) essay quality.

1st POST ASSIGNMENT RULES for Units 2 to 11

Your 1st Post Assignment will be graded on a scale of 0 to 6, with "ZERO" being the lowest score and "SIX" being the highest. The 1st Post Assignment is always due by 11:59pm EST (Eastern Standard Time) on the designated due date. A <u>2-point deduction</u> will be imposed for each day the 1st Post Assignment is late.

The 1st Post Assignment contains your answer to my Discussion Board question. Your 1st Post Assignment must be a minimum of 650 words in length. Only your name should appear as a top heading. Any other heading information (aka, date, course name and number, semester, etc.) will not count towards the length requirement. You may write more, if you feel the need or desire.

Your 1st Post Assignment should be single-spaced, using Times New Roman font, 12-point size. I strongly advise that you type your response into Microsoft Word, Google Docs, or some other word processor software. Save your final version onto your computer as a backup. Then copy and paste your final version into the Discussion Board to submit.

The 1st Post Assignment response <u>MUST ONLY</u> use information AND quotations (placed within quotation marks) taken from the <u>assigned Course Materials</u> designated for each Unit. <u>No non-course materials</u> can be used in your 1st Post Assignment.

You MUST show that you have read, watched, and interacted with the course materials. To do this, you are <u>required</u> to <u>include quotations</u> from the assigned course materials as proof of interaction.

Each <u>individual quotation</u> from a reading, video, music, or transcript can be <u>no longer than 3 sentences</u> in length. Each quotation <u>MUST</u> also be followed by a citation. Below are the citation formats you will use in the course.

- To cite quotations from **READINGS**, use author's last name(s) and page number inside parentheses. For example, (Reilly, 2)
- To cite quotations from **VIDEOS**, use abbreviated title and time-stamps in parentheses. For example, (*A Class Divided*, 2:35-2:50)
- To cite quotations from **VIDEO TRANSCRIPTS**, use abbreviated title and page number. For example, (*A Class Divided*, 2)

2nd POST COMMENTARY RULES for Units 2 to 11

The 2nd Post Commentary will be graded on a scale of 0-2, with "ZERO" being the lowest score and "TWO" being the highest. The 2nd Post is always due by 11:59pm EST (Eastern Standard Time) on the designated due date.

The 2nd Post Commentary contains your commentary on and/or analysis of another student(s)' 1st Post Assignment. Your 2nd Post Commentary must be a minimum of 325 words in length. You may write more, if you feel the need or desire. Only your name should appear as a top heading. Any other heading information (aka, date, course name and number, semester, etc.) will not count towards the length requirement.

Your 2nd Post Commentary should also be single-spaced, using Times New Roman font, 12-point size. I strongly advise you to type your response into Microsoft Word, Google Docs, or some other word processor software. Save your final version onto your computer as a backup. Then copy and paste your final version into the Discussion Board to submit.

If you have difficulty meeting the 325 word minimum for the 2nd Post Commentary, then feel free to comment on more than one student's 1st Post Assignment. If you do, remember that your 2nd Post Commentaries (plural) must add-up to a total of 325+ words.

ALSO, your 2nd Post Commentary <u>MAY INCLUDE RELEVANT</u> information from <u>non-course materials</u>.

QUICK DISCUSSION BOARD CHECKLIST

- 1) Meet the length requirement 1st Post Assignment is 650 words minimum and 2nd Post Commentary is 325 words minimum. Only your name as a top heading.
- 2) Single-spaced, using Times New Roman font, 12-point size.
- 3) In your 1st Post Assignment, answer all Parts of the Unit Discussion Board i. e, Parts A, B, C, D, etc.
- 4) In your 1st Post Assignment, include supporting information AND quotations (placed within quotation marks) taken from the assigned Course Materials.
- 5) In your 1st Post Assignment, include citations at the end of each quotation. Only use the supplied citation formats.
- 6) Submit by the deadlines.

DISCUSSION BOARD INTERACTION and ETIQUETTE:

When communicating with your fellow students in the Discussion Board and with your instructor, remember that we do so respectfully. Throughout the course, we will often agree with each other's perspectives. Nonetheless, given the nature of the course topic and materials, we will also at times disagree.

When we do disagree, please make sure to do so respectfully — since all of us are here to learn more about and deepen our understanding of this course topic.

FINAL PAPER:

<u>Directions</u>: The Final paper is due Friday, January 24th by 11:59pm EST. For the Final Paper, simply take ONE (1) of your 1st Post Assignments and expand it into a longer paper. You may use your 1st Post Assignment as the basis of your Final Paper. The Final Paper should be 1,300 words minimum, double-spaced, Times New Roman font, 12-point size. Only your name can appear at the top of your paper. You may write more, if you feel the need or desire.

NO Outside Sources: You <u>MUST ONLY</u> use information AND quotations (placed within quotation marks) taken from the <u>assigned Course Materials.</u>

Citations: Follow the citation format used for your Discussion Board assignments.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To introduce students to major issues and events in global history from the late 18th century to the present, including but not limited to the wars of independence in Europe and the Americas, industrialization, colonialism and anti-colonialism, nationalism, the World Wars, the Cold War, and globalization.
- 2. To teach students to understand individual historical events and issues within the context of the interactions of peoples across different geographical regions from the late 18th century to the present.
- 3. To enable students to ask meaningful questions about historical developments and events related to causation, significance, and continuity versus change, across a range of distinct geo-political and cultural contexts from the late 18th century to the present.
- 4. To enable students to analyze and understand an array of primary and secondary sources related to world history from the late 18th century to the present by evaluating authorship, bias, context, and accuracy.
- 5. To introduce students to different interpretive approaches or historiographical debates related to the understanding of events and issues in global history from the late 18th century to the present.
- 6. To enable students to analyze contemporary world events by making connections with relevant historical developments from the late 18th century to the present.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Students will be able to:

- 1. Identify major issues and events in world history, with an emphasis on connections and interdependencies, in the regions of Europe, Africa, Asia and the Americas from the late 18th century to the present. The historical issues and events examined will include imperialism, warfare, population growth, migration, economic development, modes of labor, medical and scientific exchange, continuity and change in systems of religious belief, popular culture and its evolution, the formation of political systems and reformist and revolutionary challenges to those systems, and the development of racial, ethnic and gender divisions and hierarchies and challenges to those structures.
- 2. Demonstrate an ability to situate individual historical events and issues within the context of the global interactions of peoples across different geographical regions from the late 18th century to the present.
- 3. Locate, evaluate, and apply information on historical developments and events in global history with an emphasis on development over time and the interdependencies among different geographical regions from the late 18th century to the present.
- 4. Demonstrate critical and analytical skills by evaluating authorship, bias, context and accuracy in the primary evidence (written, visual and material) and secondary literature in global history from the late 18th century to the present.
- 5. Identify different interpretive approaches or historiographical debates related to the understanding of events and issues in global history from the late 18th century to the present.
- 6. Apply knowledge of global history from the late 18th century to the present to the analysis and discussion of contemporary world developments and trends.
