This course requires senior status and is the capstone course of the undergraduate business program. It concerns strategic management and strategic planning.

The course will involve substantial online interaction, a lot of research and a great deal of writing. In short, it will make substantial demands on your time and effort. Please study this outline carefully.

4. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, students should be able to accomplish the following:

- Analyze the main structural features of an industry and develop strategies that position the firm most favorably in relation to competition.
- Recognize the different stages of industry evolution and recommend strategies appropriate to each stage.

- Appraise the resources and capabilities of the firm in terms of their ability to confer sustainable competitive advantage and formulate strategies that leverage a firm's core competencies.
- Demonstrate understanding of the concept of competitive advantage and its sources and the ability to recognize it in real-world scenarios.
- Distinguish the two primary types of competitive advantage: cost and differentiation and formulate strategies to create a cost and/or a differentiation advantage.
- Recognize strategic decisions that present ethical challenges and make appropriate recommendations for ethical decision-making.
- Understand issues that pertain to power, coercion and structural modes of exploitation in the broader world of capitalism.

6. READINGS

All the reading will be provided online. We will not use any textbook in this course. However, there will be several readings that you will be assigned. I will be uploading some of my notes as PowerPoint slides under the "Course Material" section of your Blackboard site. In addition, you will have to read and review a book titled *Amazon Unbound: Jeff Bezos and the Invention of a Global Empire* by Brad Stone. You can either buy the book, or get it from your local library.

7. MODULE MATERIAL

Each module of this course will contain a combination of the following:

- (a) Readings from the textbook and other sources.
- (b) Videos and audio files including class lectures, documentaries, news clips, etc.
- (c) Assignments for the module.

8. ASSIGNMENTS

You will be required to submit a set of 7 writing assignments for the class (such as short essays, discussion forums, and blog posts). You will be assessed on the basis of detailed rubrics that can be found on the Blackboard page for this course. Late submissions will not be graded except in the case of a documented emergency. No assignments will be offered for extra credit. Grades and feedback are typically provided within 3 days.
